Dear Honorable Judge Lottie E. Wilkins,

Forgive me for addressing you once again, but I feel that I must act. I have been quiet for too long. Two and a half years since I was improperly labeled "an incapacitated person". I am 82 years old and time is precious to me.

Therefore, I respectfully request that you reexamine the Article 81 status that was given to me. I am not incapacitated. That is an inaccurate description of me.

I do everything for myself: shopping, cooking, dressing myself. I follow what is going on in the world.

I converse with people. I am presently enrolled in a course at the Henry George School for Social Sciences.

I have been independent all my life. I have never been in debt. My bills were paid promptly. I worked all my life, as a librarian, a teacher, a translator.

I am presently being evaluated as of my own initiative, by a psychologist,

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by Dr. William Wiener and
a psychiatrist, Dr. Nensio Pomara,
in an attempt to establish that
my thinking is clear and my mind
is sound.

Back in the fall of 2005 I did not
fully understand what was happening
to me. I have impaired vision and
reading is difficult to me. At the time
I met with attorney Steven Neal.
We had a long conversation about my
life, but I don't remember any discus-
sion of my legal rights. I was not
informed of the consequences of the
hearing which took place on
October 20, 2005, at 60 Center St.
I was not aware that I was facing
the loss of so many of my civil
liberties.

Please consider my request for
reevaluation of my status. I don't want
to die labeled as an incapacitated person.
I beg you, Judge Wilkins, for your help.
